STUDENT NURSES EMPOWERED THROUGH SIGN LANGUAGE TRAINING

SECOND QUARTER STAKEHOLDERS MEETING HELD AT CCH

Chitungwiza Central Hospital hosted a successful stakeholders meeting on 11 July, 2024.

The meeting was held in the main staff dining hall adjacent to the hospital's kitchen.

A total of 55 stakeholders from various organizations, including Mufudzi Wakanaka, Zvandiri, ZANU PF, NCPD, ZRP, YPNSRH, WARD, and Chitungwiza community members attended the meeting.

Speaking on behalf of the Chief Medical Officer, Dr Jonah Kasule, Acting Clinical Director, welcomed guests and emphasized the importance of stakeholder meetings in enhancing communication between the hospital and the community.

Dr Kasule reiterated the hospital's opendoor policy saying: "Our offices are open for you all to visit with queries or suggestions. I must thank you, our stakeholders, for your donations and contributions. However, we continue to face a myriad of challenges such as limited space, manpower shortages, and general lack of funding."

Dr Kasule highlighted the hospital's recent achievements, citing the introduction of neurosurgery, and efforts to curb corruption.

Addressing the same meeting on behalf of the Director of Operations, CCH Executive Administrator, Mr Bright Mupindu, reported on the hospital's achievements since the last stakeholders meeting.

Said Mr Mupindu: "I'm happy to announce that CCH has achieved a lot since we last met. These include renovation of the Private Ward; donation of two ambulances by Passion Java Ministries and Lily Java Foundation; and receipt of a 65-seater bus from MoHCC for staff transportation. We also have ongoing projects which include borehole drilling to address water shortages; construction of a mortuary ablution facility; car park construction and installation of benches in the garden area."

After presentations from hospital management, CCH Public Relations Officer, Dr Audrey Tasaranarwo opened the floor for stakeholders to air their views.

Community development advocate, Cde Munyaradzi Chizola from ZANU-PF commended the overall services offered at the hospital and implored the hospital management to prioritize the acquisition of CT Scan and ECG machines.

"We are in dire need of specialized machinery at our referral hospital so that we can get all the medical care we need here. Accessing the CT scan and ECG machines outside the public hospital is very costly and beyond the reach of many," said Cde Chizola.

REHABILITATION DEPARTMENT COMMEMORATES WORLD CLUBFOOT DAY

CCH Rehabilitation Department held a belated commemoration of World Clubfoot Day on 24 July 2024.

The day is recognized worldwide every June 3rd, to celebrate the birthday and remarkable work of Dr Ignacio Ponseti, the developer of the Ponseti method for treating clubfoot deformity.

The goal of World Clubfoot Day is to raise awareness about clubfoot deformity and its prevention using the Ponseti method, a non-surgical treatment that includes gentle manipulation of the deformed feet followed by casting and temporary bracing.

CCH Rehabilitation Head of Department, Mrs Shumba, expressed gratitude for the unlimited support given to her department by internal and external stakeholders.

"I acknowledge PRO for handling grievances and supporting us. I appreciate parents and caregivers for their adherence to treatments as well as their gratitude. I appreciate the CMO, management and Ministry of Health and Child Care for unwavering support, especially for resources we use. I also appreciate and thank Rehab staff and doctors for being there for the patients."

She added that as a department they celebrate the World Clubfoot Day annually and this year they were running under the theme, "Brace for Success."

Presenting a keynote speech during the occasion, Medical Rehabilitation Technician, Mr Godwell Gurure emphasized the importance of public awareness that clubfoot is a treatable deformity.

"This day is an important step in furthering global awareness that clubfoot is a treatable deformity and supports Dr. Ponseti's belief that every child born with clubfoot is entitled to treatment using a low-cost, non-surgical approach," Mr Gurure said.

The commemoration day at CCH had 30 attendees, including parents and staff members, who came to grace the event with happiness and positive energy.

Mai Tanaka, a parent, gave a heartfelt testimony on how her child was helped and treated by CCH staff, to overcome clubfoot deformity. "I want to thank God for all the good work being done here. After giving birth to my child, I discovered she had a deformity, but I didn't know it was clubfoot. I was worried about how I would raise her in that state, not knowing it was treatable. After someone referred me here, the staff explained and helped me understand that it was treatable. They comforted me, and I felt at home. The department treated my daughter, and now everything is okay. I just want to thank you; my child is doing fine," narrated Mai Tanaka emotionally.

She capped her testimony with a verse from Ecclesiastes chapter 3, reminding the audience that everything has its time, including time for healing.

CCH started using the Ponseti method for treating clubfoot in 2014, which saw at least a thousand children getting treatment over the past decade.

Parents in attendance celebrated with joyful singing.

CCH Public Relations Officer, Dr Tasaranarwo, also graced the event.

Drugs and a meal plan were prescribed but the mother could barely afford anything.

Rachel, a Social Work Student and PR intern, went as far afield as Chigovanyika to purchase the requisite drugs using funds from the PR charity purse, while Dr Tasaranarwo coordinated contributions towards food and other basics for the mother and children.

Meanwhile, members of the SDA Church who caught wind of the PR charity purse commended the initiative and pledged support.


For Dr Tasaranarwo and her staff, such support is a timely intervention as more resources are needed to strengthen the PR charity purse.
